IN LIGHT OF THE MESSIAH

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Advent is a season of anticipated arrival. During the four weeks leading up to the celebration of Christmas, we look back at the long-awaited arrival of the Messiah, we look forward to the promised second arrival of Christ, and we look at the day-to-day longings for the arrival of Jesus in our midst. December can quickly fill up with countless festivities, activities, and responsibilities to prepare for Christmas, but preparing well for Christmas requires us to slow down and recognize our deep need for the arrival of Jesus Christ for our broken world.

More than any other time of year, Advent allows us to name the darkness of the world in a way that helps us yearn for light. In the same way that light is more visible in darkness, we often experience Christ's blessings in a dichotomy: hope in desperation, peace in conflict, joy in sorrow, and love in enmity. This Advent we will explore the traditional themes Hope, Peace, Joy, and Love through the lens of Handel's *Messiah*, blending the rich theological themes with the profound music of Handel's masterpiece to inspire us to relish the impact of the light of the Messiah for a dark and hurting world.

This Advent prayer guide is a gift to you from the elders of Highland Park Pres. We invite you to slow down to meditate on Scripture and lift up a prayer. There is much we often miss about Advent and preparing our hearts to encounter Jesus. Use this guide alongside our Advent sermon series, as we explore the light of the Messiah in a dark world.

If we hurry to the celebration of Christmas without recognizing our need for Christ, then hope, peace, joy, and love are dimmed. The greater our longing for the true Messiah, often, the deeper our delight in Christmas.

## A NOTE ON HANDEL'S MESSIAH

Messiah, an oratorio composed by George Frideric Handel in 1741, is the most performed choral and orchestral composition in the world. Its popularity has crossed national and cultural barriers, generational changes, and language challenges, all while presenting the compelling story of the prophecy, birth, life, death, and resurrection of our Lord and Savior, Jesus Christ. Its appeal is common to all Christian denominations and is universally admired by those of other faiths and cultures.

The most striking element of *Messiah* is the text—every word in the oratorio is a recitation of Scripture, with no commentary, narration, description, or explanation. Quotations from the prophets Isaiah, Haggai, and Malachi cover the first 30 minutes of the performance. Then, the gospel is introduced with readings from Luke and Matthew. Later, Psalms, Epistles, and final quotes from Revelation conclude the work.


This collection of Scripture was carefully curated by the librettist Charles Jennes in partnership with Handel. Together, they worked to select Scripture that could guide the listener to discover the truth of Jesus. The music that accompanies the Scripture serves as the sermon—delivering clarity, emotional undergirding, textual emphasis—in place of a preacher.

I've always felt encouraged by the popularity of this composition, knowing that there are few events when a congregation will routinely fill a church to capacity so that they can listen to Scripture being read (or in this case, sung) for over two hours. A performance of Handel's Messiah offers an extraordinary opportunity to allow the power of the faithful and artistic recitation of scripture to minister to the hearts of people from all walks of life.






